St. Oswald's VA Since 2001

St Oswald's Voluntary Aided School was created on September 1st, 2001, as a result of the amalgamation of the existing schools of Jeffreyston V. C. School and Loveston C. P. School. As an Aided school, St Oswald's works closely with the Parishes of Jeffreyston and Lawrenny. Children actively participate in Eucharist services which alternate between the school and the Parish church in Jeffreyston. The school has been situated on this site since November 1st, 2004. The building itself consists of a purpose-built Early Years classroom and three large and well-equipped classrooms. In addition, the school has a large hall, library/ELSA room and an additional quiet room where groups of children can use to complete classroom tasks and interventions.

Our Governing Body

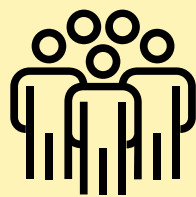

Admissions

Parents seeking a place for their son/daughter are asked to complete an application for admittance to St. Oswald's V.A School on the Pembrokeshire County Council website. Applications are considered against the Admissions Policy by the Chair of the Governing Body. Successful applicants are invited to attend an informal induction meeting with the Headteacher and members of the teaching staff prior to their son/daughter starting at St. Oswald's.



Concerns and Complaints

At St Oswald's V.A. School, we are committed to maintaining open and positive relationships with all our families. We aim to resolve any concerns quickly and fairly through clear communication and mutual understanding.

If you ever have a concern or wish to raise an issue, we encourage you to follow these steps:

1. Speak with your child's class teacher in the first instance, as most matters can be resolved swiftly at this level through discussion and clarification.
2. If the issue remains unresolved after speaking with the class teacher, you may request a meeting with the Assistant Headteacher to discuss the matter further.
3. Should the concern still not be resolved, you may then request a meeting with the Headteacher, who will work with you to reach a satisfactory outcome.

The school's Governing Body has an established Complaints Procedure to deal with any concerns that cannot be resolved through the above steps. In such cases, the matter may be referred to the Governing Body's Complaints Committee for further investigation.

It is important to note that such formal complaints are extremely rare, as the vast majority of issues are resolved quickly and informally within school.

Our School Uniform

The wearing of school uniform, although optional for primary pupils, is encouraged at St Oswald’s to increase the children’s sense of belonging and identity. Children are encouraged to wear uniform for school visits to assist identification.

Our uniform consists of:

- o Sage green sweatshirt / cardigan
- o Gold polo shirt
- o Grey/black trousers /skirts / jogging bottoms
- o Green fleece
- o Black shoes



The school logo is embroidered onto the fleeces, polo shirts, cardigans and sweatshirts and was designed by pupils, however it is not compulsory for pupils to have the logo on their clothing. School uniforms can be directly purchased from Tees RUs in New Hedges, Tenby and from Wheelers Embroidery, Cresselly. All children must bring a change of clothes for P.E. All clothing must be clearly marked with the children’s name to assist with identification and limit lost property.

Suitable clothing for activities may include: -

Physical Education: jogging bottoms/shorts, t- shirt, sweatshirt, trainers/football boots.

Swimming: towel, appropriate swim wear, swimming hat and goggles

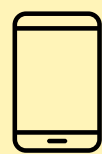
Art & craft: an old shirt/apron if requested by the teacher.

Physical Education is compulsory, children who do not bring appropriate sports clothing or footwear will be given spare clothing/footwear from our lost property box.

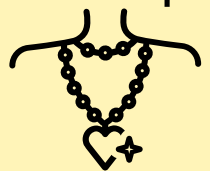
Valuables

In the interest of Health and Safety pupils are not encouraged to bring valuable personal items to school.

Mobile telephones and smart watches are not permitted.



For Health and Safety reasons the wearing of jewellery is NOT allowed – apart from the wearing of ‘one stud’ earring in each ear.



All money sent to school, should be sent in a clearly marked envelope stating the amount, the children’s name and the purpose for which it is intended.

Pupils should not bring money into the building unless there is a specific purpose.



Our start and finishing times



Breakfast Club:

Doors open at 8:00am

Doors close at 8:30am

Breakfast club forms are available from the office.

Morning sessions:

Dosbarth Little Acorn pupils attending Breakfast Club go into class and begin their morning carousel activities.

Main playground gates for pupils in all other classes open at 8:40am.

Dosbarth Little Acorns: 9:00am - 11:50am (doors open at 8:45am)

Part time nursery end their morning session at 11:30am.

Dosbarth Willow: 9am - 11:55am

Dosbarth Sycamore: 9:00am - 12:05pm

Dosbarth Oak: 9:00am - 12:10pm

A morning break of 15 minutes is taken by all pupils between 10:30am - 10:45am

Dosbarth Little Acorns and Dosbarth Willow have their 'snack time' at 10:15am before going out to play.

We encourage children to bring a piece of fruit in for their snack.

Wrap around care

Part-time nursery pupils attending the afternoon session at Jeffreyeston Playstation remain in Little Acorns until lunchtime. At 11:50am, they move to the hall for lunch. Once they are ready, our lunchtime supervisors take them outside to the Little Acorns playground. Afterwards, staff walk children to Jeffreyeston Playstation for their afternoon session, which starts at 13:00.

Afternoon sessions:

All classes start their afternoon session at 13:00

All classes end their day at 15:15.

Wrap-around Care and Clubs

At St Oswald's V.A. School, we understand the importance of flexible, high-quality childcare to support our families. We are proud to offer a range of before and after school provision, as well as engaging extracurricular opportunities for our pupils.

Breakfast Club

We offer a daily Breakfast Club, funded by the Welsh Government's Free Breakfast Initiative. This provides free childcare and a nutritious breakfast for pupils who arrive before the start of the school day.

The Breakfast Club is open to all pupils and runs from 8:00am to 8:30am, Monday to Friday.

It is important that children are not dropped off before 8:00am, as supervision is not available before this time.

A typical breakfast includes cereal (non-sugar coated), milk, toast, and fruit juice. Children must be registered to attend — registration forms are available from Mrs. Morgan in the school office.

After School Club – Jeffreyston Playstation

Our After School Club, run by Jeffreyston Playstation, provides a safe, caring, and fun environment for pupils after the school day.

The club runs from 3:15pm to 5:00pm, Monday to Thursday, and 3:15pm to 4:00pm on Fridays.

Children are fully supervised and enjoy a snack alongside a range of exciting activities such as games, crafts, and outdoor play.

Jeffreyston Playgroup – Nursery Wraparound Care

The Jeffreyston Playgroup also provides wraparound care for children attending our nursery morning session.

This allows children to stay on site for lunch and continue their day with an afternoon session at the Playgroup.

Holiday Club

Jeffreyston Playstation also offers a Holiday Club for working parents during school holidays (the days offered are subject to demand).

Places are limited and fill up quickly, so early booking is recommended. Please contact Miss Morton for more information or to reserve a space.

After School Enrichment Clubs

In addition to the wraparound care options provided by Jeffreyston Playstation, school staff run a variety of after school clubs until 4:00pm.

These clubs vary each term and may include activities such as sports, art and craft, choir, and gardening.

A club letter is sent home at the beginning of each term outlining the available clubs and the year groups they are open to.



Attendance at St. Oswald's



Good attendance is essential for every child's success at school. At St. Oswald's VA School, we are committed to ensuring that all pupils attend regularly and on time so that they can make the most of every learning opportunity.

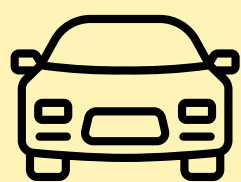
Pupil registration is a legal requirement. Attendance is recorded electronically at the start of both the morning and afternoon sessions, with the information submitted directly to County Hall. Late arrivals are also noted in the register.

The Welsh Government and Local Authority set clear expectations for school attendance, and the governing body monitors attendance closely, setting annual targets to maintain our strong record. Most of our pupils attend very well, and we are proud of their commitment and enthusiasm for learning.

Where a child's attendance causes concern, our Education Welfare Officer (EWO) may become involved to work closely with families and offer support in improving attendance. In exceptional cases, when attendance remains low and there are a high number of unauthorised absences, a fixed penalty notice may be issued. However, we always prefer to work collaboratively with families to find positive solutions.

The Welsh Government provides clear guidance on what constitutes an authorised or unauthorised absence. Authorised absences typically include reasons such as illness, medical or dental appointments, family bereavement, educational activities elsewhere, or special events. Other absences—including family holidays taken during term time—are classed as unauthorised.

Together, we can help ensure your child enjoys excellent attendance and the best possible start to their education.



Early Collection

Sometimes parents ask for their child to come out of school during the school day, usually for very good reasons, for example, to attend an emergency medical or dental appointment. We are always very happy to support these requests.

Please let us know the reasons in advance and then on the day simply come to the front door at the prearranged time and we will bring your child out to you. In the interests of safety, no child will be allowed to leave school unless collected by a parent/carer.



Family Holidays During Term Time

The Welsh Government strongly advises that family holidays should be taken during official school holiday periods, rather than during term time. As a result, any holidays taken during the school term will be recorded as unauthorised absences.

If you are planning to take your child out of school for a holiday, please inform the school in advance and complete the necessary holiday request form. This helps us to keep accurate attendance records and ensures that we can offer appropriate guidance and support.

At the start of each academic year, parents receive a full list of school term and holiday dates, including any planned staff training (INSET) days. These dates are provided well in advance to help families plan holidays accordingly. Updated copies of the term dates are also available on the Pembrokeshire County Council and school websites.

Illness and Absence Due to Medical Reasons



If your child is unwell and unable to attend school, please either telephone the school office or message the class teacher or Mrs. Morgan by 9:30am on the morning of their absence. For safeguarding reasons, if we have not received an explanation by this time, we will contact parents or carers directly to confirm the reason for absence — though we would be very grateful if you could inform us first.

We understand that it can sometimes be difficult to decide how long to keep your child away from school, especially in cases of infectious illness. To help parents with this, Public Health Wales provides clear guidance on the appropriate length of absence for common illnesses. For example, they advise that children with chickenpox should remain at home for five days after the appearance of the rash.

We actively promote good attendance and recognise the vital role it plays in every child's education and wellbeing. Please consider carefully before keeping your child at home — often children who feel slightly unwell or tired, but are not infectious, can still attend school and benefit from being in a structured and supportive environment. Research consistently shows that strong attendance is closely linked to positive learning outcomes.

If your child requires prescribed medication during the school day (e.g. antibiotics), school staff are able to administer it once the relevant consent form has been completed and signed by a parent or carer. Unfortunately, we are unable to administer non-prescribed medication, although parents are welcome to visit the school during the day to do so themselves.

If a child becomes unwell during the school day, one of our qualified first aiders will assess them. If it is felt that they should go home, parents or carers will be contacted immediately and asked to collect their child.

However, if your child is clearly unwell or showing signs of a potentially infectious condition before the start of the school day, we strongly recommend keeping them at home until they are well enough to return. This helps to protect your child's health and that of others in our school community.

Communication with Parents

At St Oswald’s V.A. School, we believe that strong partnerships between home and school are key to every child’s success. We are committed to keeping parents fully informed and involved in school life.

Ways We Communicate with Parents



Facebook

We have an active school Facebook page, St Oswald’s V.A. School, which has become one of our most effective ways to share news and celebrate the achievements of our pupils. We regularly post photographs of the children enjoying their learning, and any special events they take part in. If you are not a regular Facebook user, you may wish to set up a simple account purely for following school updates.



Class Dojo

We use the class dojo app to share important information and upcoming events with all parents. Parents can message class teachers privately to ask any questions or to request specific information.



Monthly Newsletters

We post a monthly newsletter on the school story on Class Dojo and on our website. Our Newsletters include key dates, staff updates, curriculum information, and other important news.



School Website

Our school website, <https://www.stoswaldsvajeffreyston.com>, contains a wealth of useful information, including policies, term dates, newsletters, and class information. It is an excellent resource for both current and prospective parents to learn more about St Oswald’s and the experiences we provide.



Curriculum Information

At the start of each term, parents receive a Curriculum Information Sheet from class teachers. This outlines the topics and areas of learning for the term ahead and helps parents support their children’s learning at home.



Annual Report to Parents

Each autumn term, the Governing Body produces an Annual Report to Parents, which highlights the school’s achievements, developments, and priorities over the past year. This report provides a clear overview of the progress and successes within our school community.



Parents’ Evenings

We hold parents’ evenings in the Autumn and Spring term. Appointment slips are sent home with your allocated date and time. In addition, teachers provide written annual reports towards the end of the summer term, giving a detailed summary of each child’s progress and achievements.



‘Meet the Teacher’ Evenings

At the beginning of the autumn term, we host ‘Meet the Teacher’ evenings, giving parents an opportunity to get to know their child’s new teacher and classroom routines.

Well-being Wednesdays

Every Wednesday, pupils are invited to come to school dressed in clothing suitable for Physical Education. Wednesdays are dedicated to health and well-being, with teachers planning lessons that focus on this important Area of Learning and Experience.

In addition, we organise four house mornings each term. During these sessions, pupils come together in their House groups with their lead teacher to take part in fun, team-building activities that strengthen friendships, encourage collaboration, and build a real sense of community spirit.

Our Houses

Pupils belong to one of our four houses. When they start school, they will be allocated a house that they will remain in for the time they are at st. Oswald's.

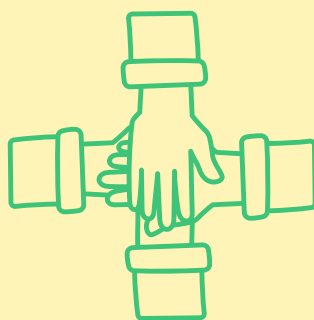

At St. Oswald's, we value every child and believe that all pupils should have the opportunity to be heard in a safe, supportive, and nurturing environment. We are proud of the strong sense of community within our school, where children are encouraged to share their ideas, opinions, and aspirations to help make St. Oswald's the best it can be.

Each September, we begin our school year with an exciting event known as Campaign Week. During this week, pupils have the opportunity to campaign to become members of one of our Pupil Voice groups. Children design creative campaign posters or leaflets and prepare short presentations explaining why they would like to join a particular group and what qualities or ideas they can bring.

At the end of Campaign Week, each class takes part in a blind ballot, ensuring that every vote is fair and confidential. Elected pupils then become representatives in their chosen Pupil Voice group, where they work collaboratively to share the views of their peers and contribute to school improvement.

Through this process, our pupils develop confidence, leadership, and communication skills, while learning the importance of democracy, respect, and teamwork.

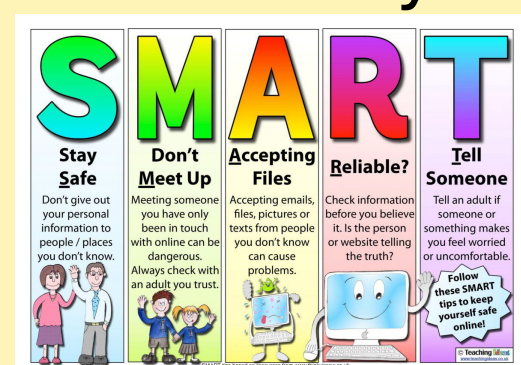

Areas of Learning and Experience

The Curriculum for Wales is built around six Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs), which together provide a broad and balanced education for every child.

At St. Oswald's, each area is led by a dedicated member of our teaching staff who oversees its development and ensures high-quality learning across the school.

Expressive Arts – Incorporating art, dance, drama, film and digital media, and music. This area encourages creativity, imagination, and critical thinking, giving pupils opportunities to express themselves and perform with confidence.

Humanities – Encompassing geography, history, and religious education, Humanities helps pupils explore human experiences, understand the world around them, and appreciate Welsh culture and heritage.

Health and Wellbeing – Focusing on physical, psychological, emotional, and social development, this area supports pupils in making informed decisions about their health and wellbeing, and in building positive relationships and resilience.

Science and Technology – Covering science, computer science, and design and technology, this area encourages curiosity, innovation, and problem-solving through practical investigation and exploration.

Mathematics and Numeracy – From learning through play in the Early Years to developing independent and collaborative problem-solving skills in later stages, pupils build a strong foundation in mathematical thinking and application.

Languages, Literacy and Communication – Including Welsh, English, literature, and international languages, this area develops communication skills, cultural understanding, and confidence in language use. Welsh is taught as a compulsory additional language for all pupils who do not speak it as their first language.

Across all six areas, literacy, numeracy, and digital competence are woven throughout the curriculum, ensuring pupils develop essential skills for learning and life.



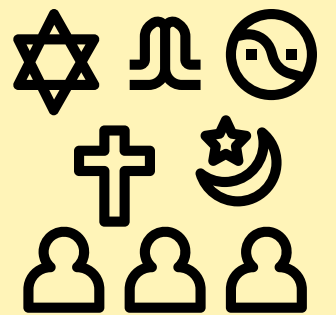
Religion, Values and Ethics

As a Voluntary Aided Church in Wales School, Religion, Values and Ethics (RVE) plays a central role in the life and curriculum of St. Oswald's. Our approach to RVE reflects both the Pembrokeshire Agreed Syllabus and the Church in Wales sub-lenses, ensuring that teaching is rooted in Christian values while embracing a broad and balanced exploration of faith, belief, and worldviews.

RVE is taught as a stand-alone subject, allowing pupils to develop a deep understanding of spiritual, moral, and ethical questions, as well as a respect for diverse beliefs and traditions. It also runs as a golden thread through all Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs), enriching pupils' learning and personal development across the curriculum.

Through our RVE teaching, pupils are encouraged to:

- Explore life's big questions about meaning, purpose, and belonging
- Develop empathy, compassion, and respect for others
- Reflect on their own values and beliefs
- Understand how faith and values influence individuals and communities locally, nationally, and globally



At St. Oswald's, RVE helps shape our pupils into thoughtful, ethical, and informed citizens, grounded in the Christian ethos of our school and inspired to contribute positively to the world around them.





Collective Worship at St. Oswald's

At St. Oswald's, Collective Worship is a valued and central part of our school life. As a Voluntary Aided Church in Wales School, our worship reflects our strong Christian foundation while embracing the inclusive and nurturing ethos of our whole school community. We follow the Values for Life programme, focusing on one core Christian value each half term. These values help guide our daily lives, shaping our relationships, attitudes, and understanding of faith in action.

Whole School Worship

We begin each week by gathering together on a Monday morning for whole school worship in the hall, providing an opportunity to reflect, sing, and start the week in unity. On Wednesdays, we come together for our Criw Cymraeg Worship, which is led by our Criw Cymraeg pupils. This special worship is conducted entirely through the medium of Welsh, including hymns, prayers, and Bible readings, celebrating both our language and our faith. On Friday afternoons, we welcome Reverend Steve to lead our Celebration Assembly. This joyful worship gives us the opportunity to reflect on the week, celebrate achievements both in and out of school, and present our Superstar of the Week certificates.

Class Worship

On Tuesdays and Thursdays, pupils gather in their classrooms for Class Worship. These smaller, reflective times allow children to explore our half-termly value more personally and to pray, discuss, and share together in a calm and nurturing setting.

Special Acts of Worship

Throughout the year, we hold special acts of worship to mark key moments in the Christian calendar and in school life. These include celebrations for Harvest, Remembrance, Palm Sunday, and Christmas, among others. Some of these special services take place in school, while others are held at Jeffreyeston Church, strengthening our close links with our parish and wider community.



Inclusion and Additional Learning Needs

At St. Oswald's, we are extremely proud of our inclusive ethos and our excellent reputation for supporting pupils with Additional Learning Needs (ALN). Every child in our care is valued as a unique individual, and we are committed to ensuring that all learners reach their full potential in a nurturing, supportive, and inspiring environment.

Our pupils are well supported through strong, positive relationships with families, staff, and external agencies who work closely alongside us. All support, guidance, and interventions are carefully tailored to meet each child's individual needs and abilities. This provision is monitored and adapted regularly in a pupil-centred way, ensuring that learners remain at the heart of every decision.

We recognise that a child may have additional learning needs if they find aspects of learning significantly more challenging than others of a similar age. This may be due to physical, sensory, emotional, behavioural, or specific learning differences relating to language or mathematics. Our inclusive practice also supports pupils who are exceptionally able, ensuring that all learners are both supported and appropriately challenged.

Early identification and intervention are central to our approach. We work closely with parents, carers, and professionals to ensure that the right support is in place at the earliest possible stage. As part of this process, we hold Person Centred Planning (PCP) meetings for pupils with ALN. These meetings, attended by the child, parents, school staff, and relevant professionals, focus on the individual's needs, voice, and aspirations. Together, we decide whether a pupil's needs can be met through Universal Provision (differentiated support within the classroom) or whether they require an Individual Development Plan (IDP).

Pupils with IDPs typically receive additional or specialist support, such as targeted intervention, one-to-one provision, or access to specific expertise. We enjoy excellent working relationships with Pembrokeshire Local Authority's Inclusion Service, who provide us with invaluable professional guidance and support. Our school also benefits from regular input from educational psychologists, speech and language therapists, autism specialists, and behaviour support teachers.

Strong and open communication with parents is central to our success. We ensure that families are kept fully informed at every stage of the ALN process and work in close partnership to achieve the best outcomes for each child.

Monitoring and Assessment

The progress of every pupil is carefully monitored from the moment they join St. Oswald's. Class teachers and support staff continually assess learning through both formative (ongoing) and summative (formal) assessments. This ensures that each child's individual needs are identified early, and appropriate learning programmes are developed.

We are committed to maintaining close links with parents throughout their child's learning journey. This includes:

- Regular parent-teacher meetings to discuss progress, celebrate successes, and set future targets.
- An Annual School Report in the summer term, summarising each child's achievements and progress.
- Open communication at the start and end of the school day, with teachers available to meet with parents whenever possible (appointments are advised due to meetings or training commitments)

At St. Oswald's, we believe that strong home-school partnerships and a shared commitment to every child's success are key to enabling all pupils — whatever their individual needs — to thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.
